

Privacy notice for National Student Survey (NSS) procedures for investigating allegations of inappropriate influence on survey results

1. Introduction

The Office for Students ('OfS') is the regulator of the higher education sector in England and has certain statutory functions set out in the Higher Education and Research Act 2017. You can find more information about the OfS and the work that we do on our website: www.officeforstudents.org.uk

The OfS is responsible for managing the process for investigating allegations of inappropriate influence on behalf of the following UK higher education funding and regulatory bodies:

The OfS is committed to protecting your personal information and being clear about what information we hold about you and how we use it. This privacy notice tells you what to expect when the OfS collects personal information as part of the procedures for investigating allegations of inappropriate influence on survey results.

2. Data controller and Data Protection Officer

The OfS is the 'data controller' of any personal information collected within scope of this privacy notice. Our location and contact details are below:

Our Data Protection Officer (DPO) is the first point of contact for people whose information is processed. You can contact the DPO using the details above. You should note that this email address is monitored by other members of the OfS Knowledge and Information Governance team. Therefore, please mark any correspondence 'for the attention of the Data Protection Officer'.

3. What personal information we will hold and use

The personal information we will collect and use as part of this process is set out below:

- the full name of the person/s raising the concern (if provided)
- the provider or organisation name
- details of the allegation or concern submitted to the OfS
- the contact email address, postal address, and/or contact telephone number of the involved parties (where relevant).

Should excessive personal data be received which is not relevant to the processing of an allegation, this will be deleted and not processed further.

4. How we will use your information

We can only use your personal information where we have a specific purpose or purposes for doing so. Our purpose for using your personal data is to process allegations of inappropriate influence in the promotion and running of the National Student Survey (NSS).

To achieve the above aims, the specific uses of your personal information are listed below:

- to contact you about your concern
- to request further information from you should the OfS or a UK funding and regulatory body have any further enquiries about your allegation(s)
- by the NSS allegations panel to investigate and resolve your allegation(s).

The OfS may also work with one or more of the UK funding and regulatory bodies (where relevant) to resolve concerns raised under the procedures for investigating allegations of inappropriate influence on survey results and will share information with them as appropriate.

If we want to use your personal information for a reason other than those purposes set out above, we will tell you before we start processing and provide further information about the new purpose(s).

5. Legal basis for using your personal information

Under data protection legislation, we require a legal basis to be able to process your personal information for the purposes set out above. In this case the legal basis is:

 Processing is necessary for the performance of a task carried out in the public interest or in the exercise of official authority vested in the Controller (see UK GDPR Article 6(1)(e)).

6. Who we share your personal information with and why

NSS allegations panel

Details of an allegation will be passed to an NSS allegations panel which is chaired by a senior member of the NSS team and includes OfS officers with expertise in running the NSS, regulation, data integrity and governance. The NSS allegations panel is tasked with investigating allegations of inappropriate influence on survey results and carries out this duty on behalf of the UK funding and regulatory bodies named in Section 1. We can exercise this function jointly with UK funding and other regulatory bodies under Section 113 of the Higher Education and Research Act 2017. Should a concern relate to providers in other nations, the OfS will share the information received with the relevant UK funding and regulatory body as part of our regulatory functions and required by law.

Investigating allegations

Where the OfS considers there is a clear breach of guidance and receives sufficient supporting evidence for further investigation, it will promptly contact the provider to which the NSS data relates and request it to undertake an internal investigation. Should a concern relate to a teaching provider which is part of a provider registered with the OfS, we will request the registered provider to undertake an investigation.

Sharing NSS data

The OfS shall anonymise data relating to an allegation or investigation where possible, unless it has been deemed necessary to share it with the NSS allegations panel or provider in accordance with legal advice, or where the OfS is required to share the information as part of our regulatory functions or by law. Where necessary, details of the allegation passed to the provider may include the name or title of the individual against whom the concern has been raised and details of other third parties identified within the allegation.

The OfS will take all reasonable steps to protect the anonymity of the person/s raising the concern and of third-party individuals. However, details of concerns contained within the information provided may, in very rare circumstances, mean that the person/s raising the concern can be indirectly identified by their provider from contextual information already known.

Other than the relevant provider, we will not routinely pass your information to any other organisation except where required to do so as part of our functions or by law. While all details of allegations and subsequent investigations are treated as confidential, some information provided to the OfS may be subject to publication or disclosure under the Freedom of Information Act 2000, especially where the information relates to OfS business.

7. Where your personal information will be stored

Your personal information will be stored securely within the UK and will not be transferred outside that territory unless required by a court order.

8. How we protect your personal information

The OfS has a number of security measures in place to protect your personal information, which are listed below:

- Accredited to the Cyber Essentials Plus standard for cybersecurity.
- We meet the requirements of the Government (Cabinet Office) Security Policy Framework, which requires an annual self-assessment.
- All staff are required to undertake training in data protection and information security on joining the OfS and then on an annual basis.
- The OfS has formal policies relating to data protection, information security, and information governance that must be read and understood by all staff.
- Personal information is only available to those members of staff who require access as part
 of their role.

9. Your rights over your personal information

Once your personal information has been collected, you have certain rights under UK data protection laws in relation to that personal information. You have the right to request:

- a copy of your personal information held by the OfS
- that inaccurate personal information held about you is corrected
- your personal information to be deleted
- processing of your personal information is restricted
- a copy of your information in a format that allows easy transfer ('data portability')
- that you are not subject to automated decision making or profiling (if these take place).

All these rights have certain limitations depending on the request and the purpose for which we are holding your personal information.

10. How long we will hold your personal information

The OfS will retain a copy of your personal information until the closure of the NSS allegation of inappropriate influence case. Your personal information and corresponding case paperwork containing personal information will be destroyed after one month following closure.

Case closure is not immediate after an outcome of an investigation into allegations of inappropriate influence on survey results due to the right to request a review of the investigation outcome within 10 working days of receiving the outcome. Where a review of the investigation outcome is requested, the personal data will be deleted six months after the review closure.

11. Complaints about the use of your personal information
